

## Cub Scout Code of Conduct

### The Cub Scout Promise:

I promise that I will do my best  
To do my duty to God and to the Queen  
To help other people  
And to keep the Cub Scout Law.

### The Cub Scout Law:

Cub Scouts always do their best  
Think of others before themselves  
And do a good turn every day.

### A Cub Scout should:

- Enjoy themselves in Scouting
- Wear their uniform smartly and with pride
- Listen Well
- Be kind with their words and their actions
- Be respectful in all things

The Cub Scout Motto:  
**Be Prepared**

### Respect toward other Cub Scouts

- 'Think of others before themselves'
- Set a good example to younger cubs by behaving well, joining in and including everyone

### Resect towards Leaders and other Adults

- 'Cub Scouts always do their best'
- When leaders are speaking, be still and quiet and look at the speaker
- Follow the instructions given by leaders

### Respect towards members of the public

- 'Do a good turn every day'
- Show respect and consideration when in a public space, when on parade or representing the pack outside our headquarters

### Rewarding Good Behaviour

In return for keeping to our Code of Conduct, the leaders will reward cubs: individually, as a six or as a whole pack. Some rewards may be immediately edible, some may be built up over a longer time.

### Consequences of Breaking the Code of Conduct

**First warning:** In the first instance of poor behaviour, the cub will be warned with a clear explanation of what went wrong and how we should behave at cubs.

**Second warning:** If the poor behaviour continues and a second instance occurs, the cub will be asked to sit out of the game or activity for 5-10 minutes.

**Third Time:** If the cub is not learning from their warnings, they will miss more time from games or activities. The leadership team will also speak to the Cub's parent/carer at the end of the meeting

In extreme cases we may need to call a parent to remove their child from the rest of the evening or issue a ban from the following cub pack night. We would very much like to avoid this situation.
